Situation for students of out of US changed drastically in the time I've been here. When li was a freshman, we were in on our worlds, almost all have jobs, a lot more engagement, but across different races and classes, which is awesome. There's a better support system, resources available, getting good. Before you start thinking racism no longer exists, because everytime something like this happens you do, I want to point something out. It's not ASWU, and it's not bad administration, it's all individual students. I want to take some names here: Abebaye, Almat, Hussein, Charles, Purnima, Roland, Mutsa some names. Like Mutsa, she works works with HEAT, done a lot for international students. Almat, doing great things, I appreciate his work, for example, this break, students had to pay to stay on campus, due to his efforts, we no longer have to. Purnima, Hussein and Charles, we all know them by their spectacular smiles, and their work with career services, biology. Roland as RA, and leader in political science department, done a lot, Abe interested in everything of color. Abdul with initiatives and special events and parties, he keeps the vibes going. Everyone knows, as long as you're over 21.

My point is students have done this, imagine what could be done with your support from ASWU. There's some problems and conversations from survey, that

are easily solvable by ASWU, and as a student who pays \$150 each semester, you better fix it. Take notes, please take notes, because next time somebody brings these up, they better not be.

First, for \$8.5 a meal, we should not have to adjust to crappy potatoes that you serve here or water that you call soup or phở, that's not phở. That's bone water. Number too, accepting rules, being friends with Americans. Try to comprehend what the other person might be saying, you don't have the courage to talk to someone who calls you a foreign kid. It's not infrequent, it happens often. Last time we brought it up to Lorna and Beck, they said they're 18 year olds, they'll learn, I say no, they're 21 year olds who are about to graduate, and I don't see hope in the school.

Three, making connections. Most Americans, international students don't know people in US. Finding internships, volunteer opportunities, if ASWU can help with relations to create structures, where international students can connect with alumni and field they are interested in, that'd be helpful. I know there's something through career services, pirate link or something, but those are focused on everyone, not particular to international students. And we all know by now that catering to a wide audience doesn't mean it's accessible to everyone. Like flossing--it's true.

Four, cultural shock, especially religion. I know we are a Christian institution, we have an excessive need to be Christian on some things. If you are 21, do some weed, seriously it's too much. This an actual comment from someone--particular about ASWU, when we had a speaker come to talk about Buddhism, there was a comment online, two, back to back, quote, "Just curious, why is a Buddhist apologist coming to a Christian school? How do we glorify God by talking about Buddhism?". One, this guy clearly doesn't know what an apologist means. Two, like, we are the best Christian school for non-Christians, right? Three, if I remember the mandatory Christian class I had to take, you clearly don't know how Christ is glorified. Four, it's been 3 months since that comment, and I don't know if this is oversight, but we have not replied to that comment. It haunts me, pisses me off everytime I see it.

So, five, now, not being able to relate to faculty and staff. And that's not something we can change, clearly, that relates to WA in general, Spokane in general, and Whitworth in general. But we can have more diverse programming, don't have to stick to one way, like Spring Fest one way, and expect things to come. Like Austin said yesterday, if people keep doing chapel like you do, no one new will come in. Think of ways of making it more creative. Six, dealing with Americans with superiority complex. If you don't understand that, then you are what's being referred to, as clearly as that. It's evident, I feel

like we talk too much, like referring to Africa as a country isn't fine. You're 17 when you were in school, you should know better. Seriously--someone wrote, I think I was turned down as foreigner, wasn't vocalized like that, felt it. How does someone learn about culture? Introducing them, if you don't hire them, how are they supposed to know?

Homesickness, depression, having to advocate for myself. What bothered me most about the GER. People talked about double representation, but not existent. Karen doing lots right now, she's trying, whenever I think about that, I think how people talk about that particular thing. It's a democracy, but there's no logic.

Teri: I'm going to give you two more minutes.

Utsal: It's sad, when I see my sisters and brothers from another mother visit a counselor who can't connect, it's ridiculous. Microaggressions, don't get me started.

Getting, traveling to places. Getting a license isn't easy for us, super expensive, insurance and everything is double my rent. Think of inconvenience. Winco takes 15 min. There and back, 2-3 hours for whole process, cold or hot food, gets room temp. Jason said we're working on solution for shuttles, can get accelerated.

Jason: Student life is working on that.

Utsal: Also, on ASWU poster positions, for Americans, there's something like Portland, Oregon, but students, it's just country, city ignored. Not giving proper information. This is also the mentality we are creating, indirectly, having to explain to people. When people keep asking, that gets messy. It's about educating people better. Give me one more second.

Tersa: We have to move to shout-outs.

Utsal: Okay, let me thank some people.

Cat: That can be for shout-outs.

Utsal: It's one sentence. If you want more clarification, I don't have solutions to offer, but appreciate your listening. Thank you.

Amber: quick vibe, with current basketball scheduling, two weeks from now, Feb 21st, if thing stand as they are, we will be hosting first game of conference, 8PM, pretty cool. Cool if we have lots of people, our basketball teams usually do pretty good there. Game will be 21st, if we win, next is Saturday at Whitman. If we could get people to drive down there, too, that'd be cool.

Kevin: Hello, I'm Kevin McCartney, with intramurals, recognize some of your faces. Marketing coordinator.

Next Friday, we have a blacklight volleyball we need your help to promote, will be fun time. Starts 10PM, so after U-Rec closes, it's double elimination, and there's a registration link, and teams don't have to pay now, takes off concerns of finance.
